**VANCOUVER AIRPORT SERVICES (YVRAS) BOARD MEETS IN THE BAHAMAS,
PRESENTS FOUR-YEAR SCHOLARSHIP TO COB**

NASSAU, BAHAMAS October 20, 2009— In October 2006, Vancouver Airport Services (YVRAS) signed a 10-year agreement to provide Nassau Airport Development Company (NAD) with a management team to oversee the Lynden Pindling International Airport expansion project.

Three years later, the YVRAS board held their meetings in The Bahamas to celebrate the milestone and view progress on the \$409.5 million airport redevelopment.

“Vancouver Airport Services is proud to be a partner in the Nassau Airport Development Company (NAD) and part of the future of Lynden Pindling International Airport,” said George Casey, President and CEO of YVRAS. “The success of NAD to date is evident in the visible changes at the airport, operational and customer service improvements and the commencement of the terminal redevelopment program. Credit and recognition should be given to the Government of The Bahamas, the NAD Board of Directors and the employees of NAD. We look forward to celebrating additional milestones to come.”

Ranked one of the world’s premier airport operators, YVRAS manages an expanding network of 18 airports on three continents. This is the first time the board has met at an airport within their network.

While on island, YVRAS presented College of The Bahamas President Jayne Hodder with a four-year scholarship for a Bahamian student to study Business Management at the college. According to Mr. Casey, the scholarship is a way for the company to contribute to the broader Bahamian community.

“As airport operators, we invest in the airports we manage and as an extension of that, we invest in the communities our airports service,” said Mr. Casey. “We understand the importance of LPIA to The Bahamas and we are happy to play a part in improving the major gateway to the country.”

In 2008, YVRAS network of airports recorded consolidated revenues of over \$400 million and combined passenger traffic of approximately 27 million.
